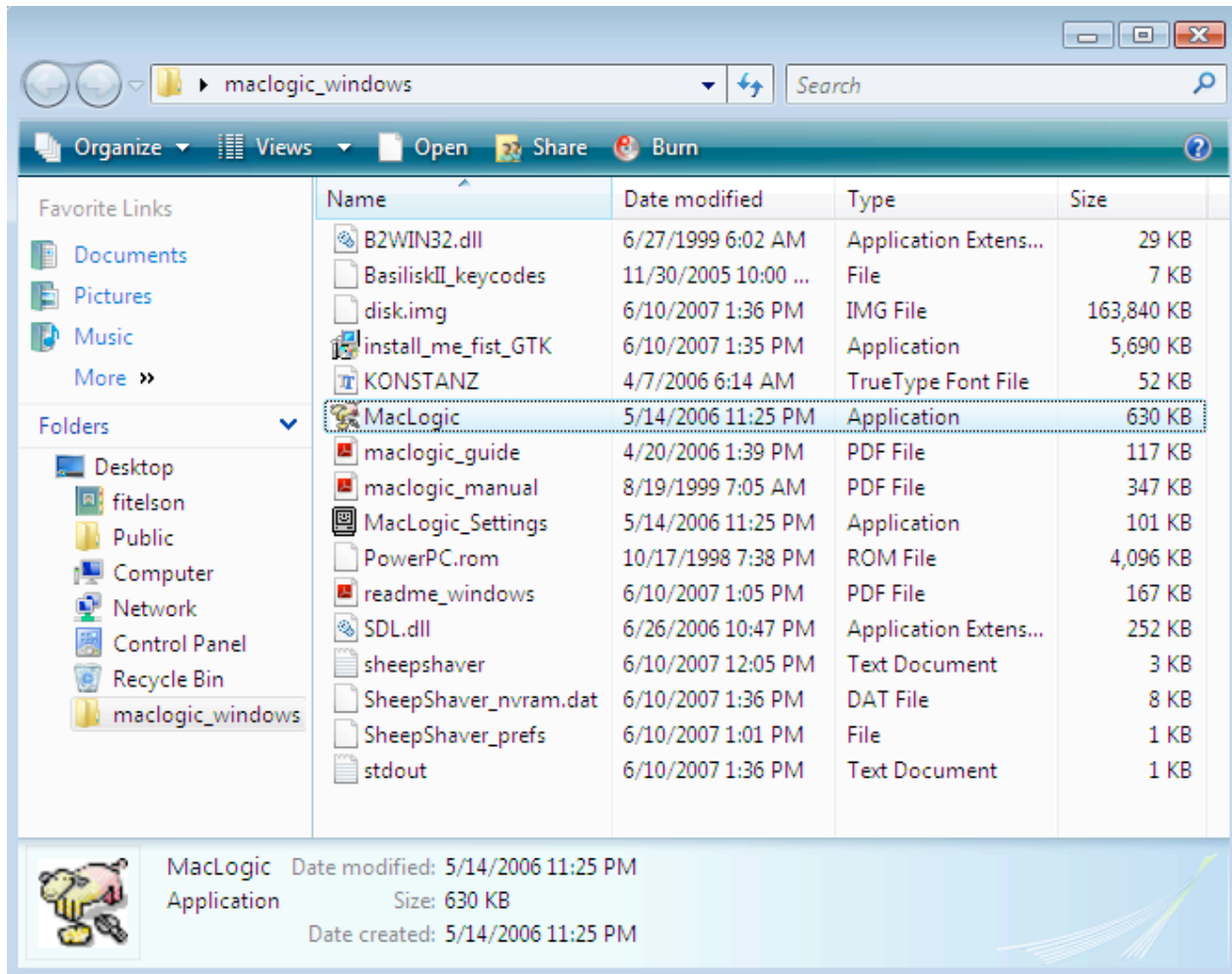


## Running MacLogic Under Basilisk II on Windows (Readme)

Now that you have downloaded and extracted the `maclogic_windows.zip` file, you should have a folder called `maclogic_windows` that looks like this (it will be in a different location, of course, since your machine has a different file structure than mine):

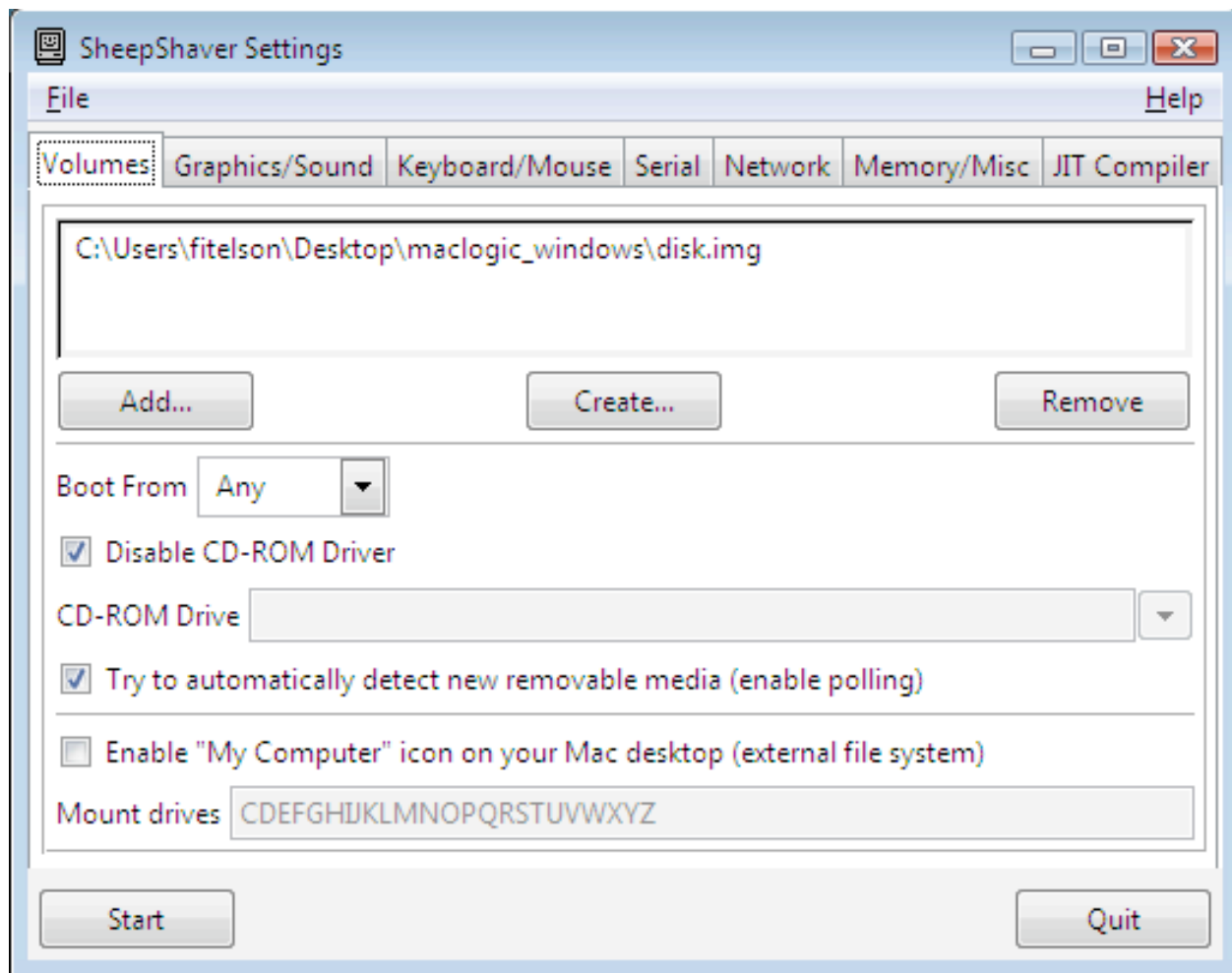


You'll now need to do two things to be able to run MacLogic in windows XP, and one additional thing to run MacLogic in Windows Vista.

First, you'll need to install GTK. This is simple. Just run the file (highlighted in the above screen shot) called `install_me_first_GTK.exe`. This is a windows installer. Follow the directions to complete the installation of GTK on your machine.

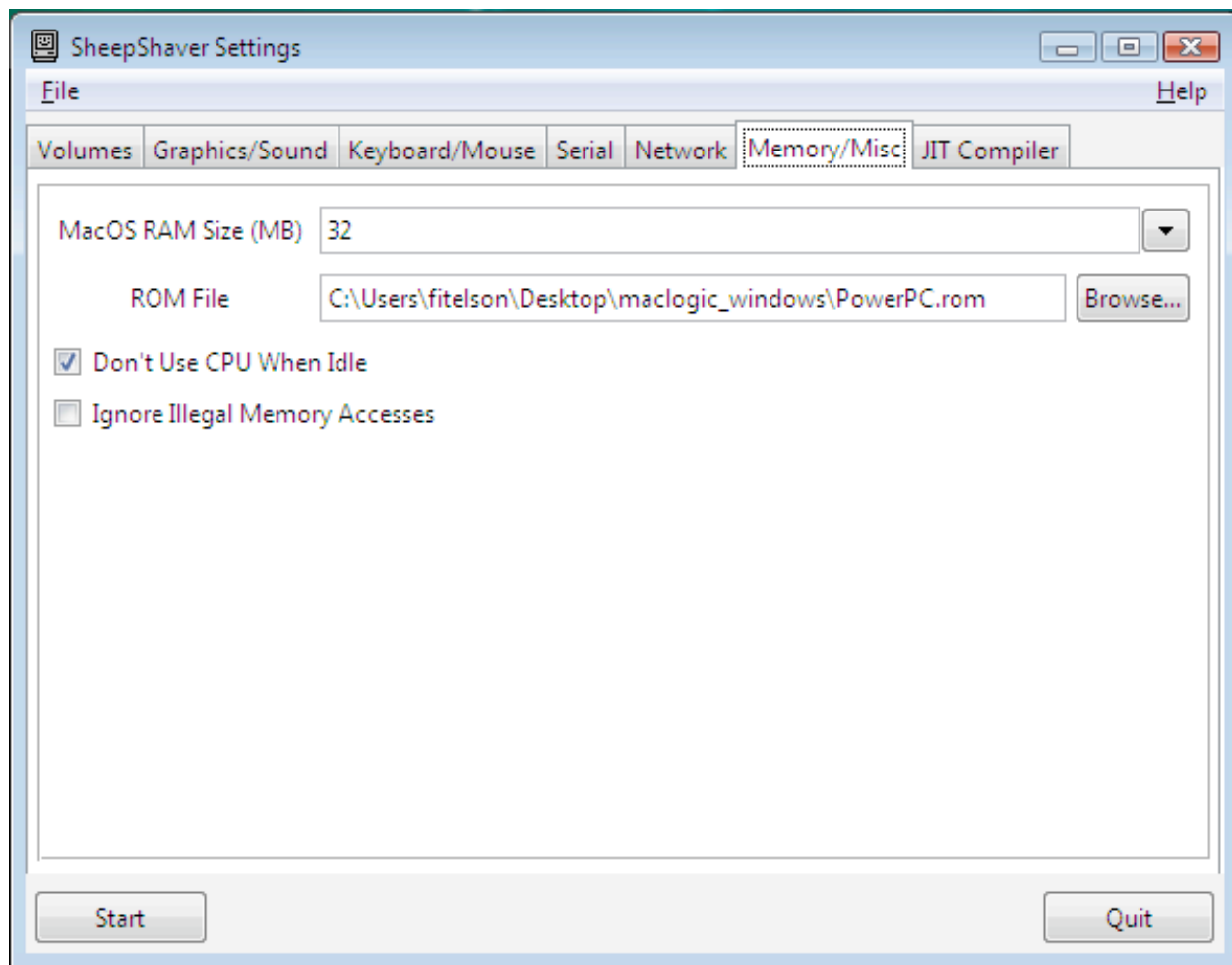
Second, after you have completed the installation of GTK, you will be ready to run the `MacLogic_Settings` program to tell the program where to find the `disk.img` file and the `PowerPC.rom` file.

When you run `MacLogic_Settings` you should get the following screen:



(1) In this Volumes pane, click Remove. Then, once this list is empty, click Add..., and select the file `disk.img` that appears in your `maclogic_windows` folder (you'll have to locate the precise location of the file on your machine from the browse window). On my computer, this adds the path above, but on your machine the path will be different, of course (it will point to wherever you have this `maclogic_windows` folder sitting):

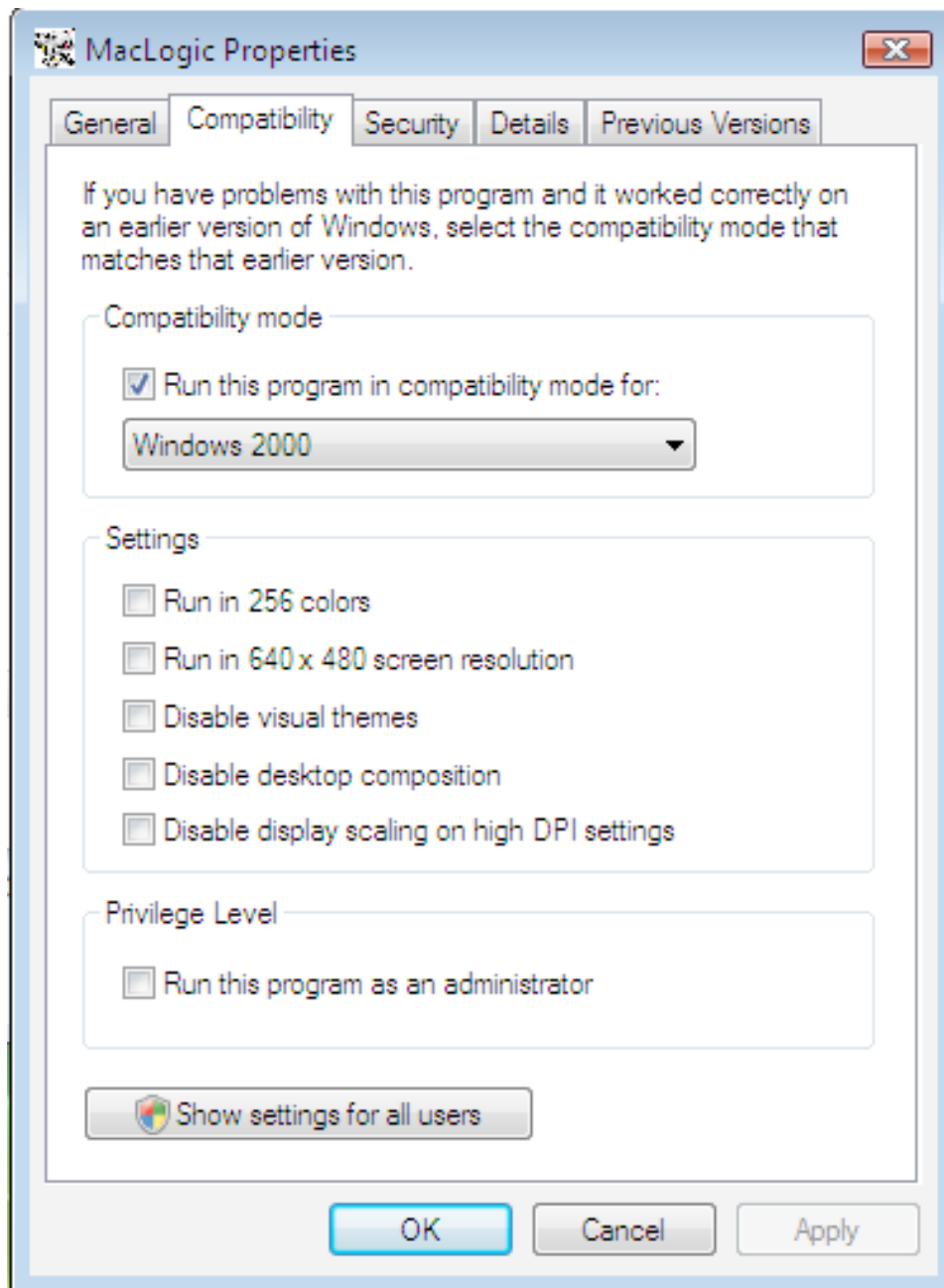
(2) Next, you need to click on the Memory/Misc pane in this dialog, and tell it where the `PowerPC.rom` file is. Use the Browse... button to locate your `maclogic_windows` folder and the `PowerPC.rom` file contained in it. This should look like the following (again, your path will be different, since the location of your `maclogic_windows` folder has a different name):



Next, you should click the `Start` button on this dialog. It will give you an error, but just ignore this (by clicking `OK`).

If you're on Windows XP (or earlier), you should now be ready to run MacLogic. Go ahead and double-click the MacLogic icon in this `maclogic_windows` folder. This should run Mac OS 7, and then MacLogic. It will give you an error first (about a missing `.sys` file), but just ignore this.

If you're on Windows Vista, there is one more thing you need to do. You need to make sure that MacLogic is set to run in Windows 2000 compatibility mode. To do this, just go to the Properties of the MacLogic file in this folder. This should look like the following:



[There is one more (optional) thing left to do, and that is to install the MacLogic font (the file KONSTANZ.TTF in the maclogic\_windows folder) into Windows. Consult your Windows help system to see how to install the Konstanx font. Note: this allows you to copy and paste text from OS 7 to Windows. This is useful for copying proofs from MacLogic into a Windows Word Processor. You don't *need* to do this in order to run MacLogic (only to copy and paste from the emulator back into Windows).]

Now, you should up and running MacLogic on your PC.
